Restorative Justice Justice that Heals

What is Restorative Justice?

Restorative Justice is a process whereby all the parties with a stake in a particular offence come together to resolve collectively how to deal with the aftermath of the offence. It is a different way of thinking about crime and conflict.

Restorative Justice focuses on holding the offender accountable in a more meaningful way. It repairs the harm caused by the offence, helps to reintegrate the offender into the community and helps to achieve a sense of healing for both victim and community.



Restorative Justice involves three main parties:

- 1- **VICTIM(s)**, or individuals harmed
- 2- **OFFENDER(s)**, or individuals causing the harm
- 3- **COMMUNITY**, the place where the harm was committed.

Restorative Justice Conferences and circles are some of the tools used in Restorative Justice. A victim may meet with the offender face to face in a Victim/Offender Conference, or with the Offender and persons from the larger community in a Family Group/Community Conference.

How does the process work?

- a. A Referral source (i.e. Individual, Court, School, Police, Church, Community Organization) contacts a Centre offering Restorative Justice services.
- b. Restorative Justice Staff interviews:
 - Victim
 - Offender
 - Community Supporters
- c. Restorative Justice Conference is scheduled and takes place.
- d. Parties (Victims, Offenders, and Community Supporters) share their stories during the Conference and reach a consensus.
- e. An agreement is reached by the parties and the referral source is notified via a Closing Summary Report / letter of completion.
- f. Follow-Up of the terms within the Agreement done by Restorative Justice Staff.



What are the benefits of Restorative Justice?

VICTIM

Restorative Justice will provide victim(s) with the opportunity to:

- Express their feelings and ask questions;
- Have their feelings, concerns and suffering acknowledged;
- Reach some understanding of the offender's motivation for committing the offence;
- Say how the harm done by the offender might be repaired.

OFFENDER

Restorative Justice gives offender(s) the opportunity to

- Take responsibility for their actions in a safe environment;
- Hear first hand how their behavior has affected people and the community;
- Benefit from the rehabilitation process;
- Reintegrate themselves in the community

COMMUNITY

Restorative Justice gives the community a chance to:

- Actively participate in achieving justice in the community;
- Support the victim and ensure there are opportunities in the community for the offender to make amends;
- Reduce crime and violence in schools;
- Prevent problems from escalating in the community;
- Help repair relationships and bring closure to incidents of conflict.
